Sermon

The texts for today make the contrasts between life and death and they point toward Easter. But each of them focus more on the life of the people of God on this side of the grave than on the resurrection.

The lesson from Ezekiel addresses a bleak time. The people of God

whom Ezekiel addresses are in the grip of uncertainty; they are in exile. In the short term there's not much to look forward to & hope & optimism are in short supply. But Ezekiel suggests that, though now dead in exile, the people will yet know what it is to live in their land.

The psalm is the cry of an individual – it's a cry of complaint, and at the same time it's a prayer, it's a howl, it's a lament. It's asking that God who knows all about 'steadfast love' will actively help the person in trouble.

And John's gospel tells the dramatic story of the raising of Lazarus.

As we hear almost 24/7 a whole lot of people are worried not only about the corona virus but, as consequence of its widespread implications, about their livelihoods as well. Where's their money going to come from ,,,, and when? And who can meet with whom? And who can travel? And who can get home from overseas? And how? Who can care for the children when the parents who have work, go to work?

All these and many many more are pressing questions arising out of real concerns, real troubles.

So in these perilous communal and personal times what are we able to glean from the Bible readings. I think that Ezekiel and the Psalmist and St John would offer us a quiet confidence. They would say something like 'hold on to your faith in God **even** in the most difficult times. Perhaps **especially** in the most difficult times'.

If you can do this then you'll find that your faith and God's faithfulness can work together to help and sustain you.

We're still in the season of Lent [sometimes we call today **Passion Sunday** when we really zero in on the impending passion of Christ]. And today was to have been our Mission service. Perhaps one of our mission aims just now could and can be to uphold each other, our communities and the world's nations in prayer as well as in whatever practical ways are open to us.

God is with us, we are not alone.

We pray for the people who have lost a family member to the virus.

We pray for your Holy Spirit's discernment amidst the many choices and decisions facing our national, community and medical leaders.

We pray we each might see quickly what more we can do to help those who are vulnerable.

This prayer for our nation in the family of nations, with all that is on our hearts, we gather now and pray through Jesus Christ our Lord. AMEN.
